Simple Solutions items coded as L.7.1 address the characteristics of the parts of speech. For example, items having to do with "verbs" cover regular and irregular verbs, simple and perfect tenses, inappropriate shifts in verb tense, and types of verbs (auxiliary, linking, transitive, intransitive, etc.).

Simple Solutions items coded as L.7.2 address all previously learned capitalization and punctuation rules.

Simple Solutions items coded as L.7.3 address aspects of sentence writing: for example, effective use of punctuation, parts of a sentence, the four sentence types, subjectverb agreement, and recognizing and correcting fragments and run-ons.

Simple Solutions items coded as W.7.2a support students' understanding of cause and effect.

Simple Solutions items coded as W.7.5 focus on editing for conventions of Language Standards 1-3.

Simple Solutions items coded as W.7.8 support the part of the standard that has to do with avoiding plagiarism and properly citing a source.

In the Topic Guide, the lesson number given indicates the first time the standard is addressed.
